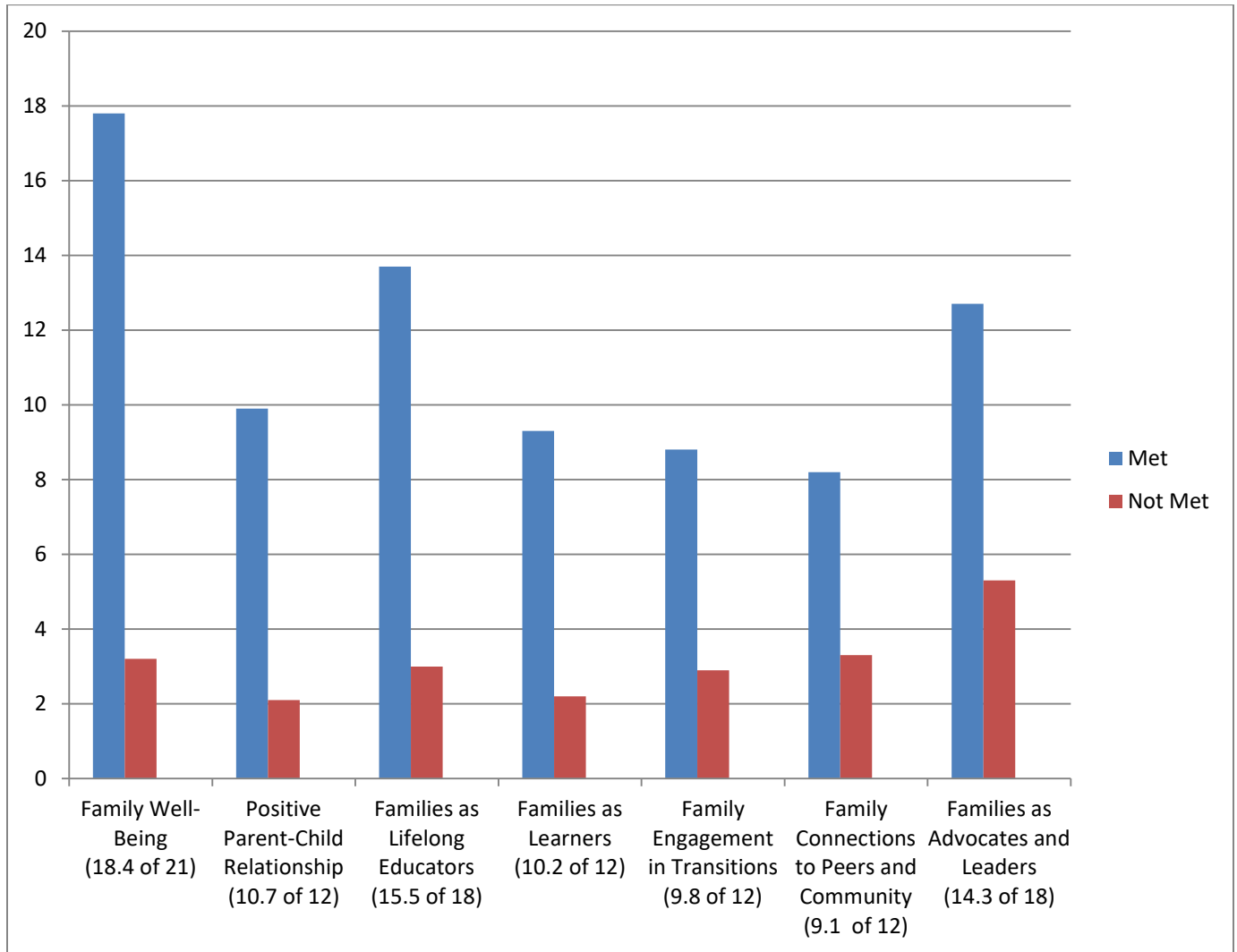


2016 – 2017 FAMILY OUTCOMES (2nd CHECKPOINT) “EHS Head Start”



Based on the program Child Plus monitoring software Family Outcomes Analysis pertaining to the “Parent, Family, and Community Engagement Framework” the above outcomes graph are aggregated based on accumulative percentage of each family goal.

The results of the 2nd Checkpoint are as follows:

1. **FAMILY WELL-BEING:** Out of 64 families (21 being the highest score that can be obtained on this goal), 52 (18.4) met and 3 did not meet (2.6 %). The agency will continue to support parents and families related to safety, maintaining good health, and showing an increase toward financial security.
2. **POSITIVE PARENT-CHILD RELATIONSHIP:** Out of 64 families (12 being the highest score that can be obtained on this goal), 57 (10.7) met and 2 families did not meet (1.3%). The agency will continue to support parents & families toward improving parenthood along with increasing a warm relationship that nurture their child's learning & development.
3. **FAMILIES AS LIFELONG EDUCATORS:** Out of 64 families (18 being the highest score that can be obtained on this goal), 54 (15.5) met and 4 families did not meet (2.5%). The agency will continue to support parents and families observe, guide, promote and participate in the everyday learning of their children at home, school, and in their communities.
4. **FAMILIES AS LEARNERS:** Out of 64 families (12 being the highest score that can be obtained on this goal), 58 (10.2) met and 2 families did not meet (1.8%). The agency will continue to support and encourage parents and families to advance their own learning interests through education, training or other experiences that support their parenting, career, and life goals.
5. **FAMILIES ENGAGEMENT IN TRANSITIONS:** Out of 64 families (12 being the highest score that can be obtained on this goal), 58 (9.8) met and 3 families did not meet (2.2%). The agency will continue to support

parents & families with advocating for their child's learning and developments as they transition from Head Start to Kindergarten.

6. **FAMILY CONNECTIONS TO PEERS AND COMMUNITY:** Out of 64 families (12 being the highest score that can be obtained on this goal), 58 (9.1) met and 3 families did not meet (2.9%). The agency will continue to support parents and families connections with peers and mentors in formal or informal social networks that are supportive and educational, along with enhancing social well-being and community life.

7. **FAMILIES AS ADVOCATES AND LEADERS:** Out of 64 families (18 being the highest score that can be obtained on this goal), 55 (14.3) met and 4 families did not meet (3.7%). The agency will continue to support parents and families participating in leadership development, decision-making, program policy development, and community and state organizing activities to improve children's development and learning experiences.
